The dancers are invited to take part in the children's tea party afterwards which is being organised by FOBS. The village hall will be open from 10.00am. Please make sure that fresh food is on paper plates and wrapped, or in tins or plastic boxes.

May sticks

All children in Year R to Year 5 require a may stick. Girls in Hedgehogs also require a posy. For a may stick you will need a 1 metre cane, doily and white ribbon for a bow. If you have any questions regarding May Day do ask your child's class teacher. We will have some examples in school to share with you - please don't worry!

Clothing - All girls to wear white dresses, white cardigan, white socks and black plimsolls. All boys to wear grey shorts/trousers, white shirt, red tie, a grey V neck jumper if required, grey socks and black plimsolls. We may have some dresses for sale in the hall and if you have any outgrown items for resale please bring them into school as soon as possible. Red ties can be purchased from the school office for £3.

The May Queen wears a headdress of flowers, provided by FOBS, as do the Year 6 girls. Only Year 6 girls can have flowers in their hair.

We are proud to be able to continue with this lovely village tradition and we are hoping for some sunshine! Let's make this a real village community event. Bring your friends, family and neighbours and enjoy the dancing and then come and join us at the village hall for tea.

<u>RE at Belton</u>

At Belton C of E Primary School, we ensure our pupils' cultural development is enhanced by an exciting, stimulating and relevant RE curriculum.

We use the Leicestershire Agreed Syllabus and the Church of England's scheme, Understanding Christianity, to guide our teaching. We always link events and celebrations from a range of faiths and cultures into our themes and topics so that they are relevant and meaningful for the children.

We have strong links with the village church and visit it regularly for services and celebrations as well as having regular visits to the school by local Reverends. Our children also visit a variety of places of worship in Leicestershire to ensure diversity and respect for others beliefs are experienced first-hand.
